- What can FHWA do?
 - Continue being available and open to Clean Cities, any questions etc.
 - Helpful to show which corridors are ready (NREL tool will help with that)
 - Could show what network would look like had applications for additional segments been received
 - Foster collaboration beyond annual application cycle
 - Helpful for states to have strategic planning support, i.e. state strategic planning
 - Evaluate the MUTCD to see if signage guidance facilitates its objectives (would be helpful if states provided feedback)
 - Show case study of NYMTC freight plan
 - Examples of P3s that were executed
 - Guidance documents down to funding options
 - Links to existing interstate alt fuel initiatives

- Midwest states can develop an MOU similar to western states – ensure higher level people are being asked and engaged
- June 27 FHWA webinar on recent RFI released on National Economic Partnership (formerly megaregions) – letters of interest due July 9
- Designations planned to be annual
- EPA working to improve upon the MOVES data regarding alt fuels

- What is your vision for system in the Midwest in 10 years?
 - Should be invisible people should have confidence to know where fuels are available and assume they are available
 - Identify interim steps now for variety of ways future can unfold
 - Reconsideration of biofuels as part of alt fuel corridor program
 - Even non binding state goals sends out a signal and has value even in informal ways, though can be overturned by future administrations

- What does promoting alt fuel technologies mean on the economy, jobs, etc.? How can we present the economic proposition for alt fuel corridors?
 - Tourism dollars e.g. states without infrastructure cannot attract affluent EV owners
 - Creating industrial parks to provide manufacturing/materials
 - Need more data/case studies to show economic argument
 - Find areas for collaboration among groups that may typically compete
 - Can serve as competitive advantage for trucking companies, e.g. Ikea making requirement that percentage of delivery company fleets have to be electric
 - Argument of diversified portfolio, particularly in states with high reliance on petroleum industry
 - Tie renewable energy to job creation and electrification

- What are <u>you</u> going to do further movement on alt fuel corridors?
 - FHWA follow up on suggestions and drafting round 3 nominations
 - Continue staying engaged with developments
 - Work with our DOT to find out what FHWA division can do to help get corridors identified
 - Think globally, act locally. Educating coworkers and others in DOT to get the excited about corridors
 - Suggest to new clean city coordinator on contacts to connect with, continue finding funding opportunities
 - Reconvene I-80 working group

- What are <u>you</u> going to do further movement on alt fuel corridors?
 - Determine how to shape input into future convenings
 - Continue to work with clean cities, report out from this meeting and NREL tools
 - Talk to freight folks and integrate into other parts of our program
 - Continue to work with Tim, I-94, rekindle I-80
 - Have ChargePoint serve as a resource with available data so programs are fully informed by station usage
 - Implement VW plan and develop RFPs for highway corridors that will benefit from funding.
 - Incorporate corridors with regional planning process
 - Reach out to IN about I-70 and Ohio DOT about signage

- What are <u>you</u> going to do further movement on alt fuel corridors?
 - Have conversations with state DOTs
 - Spread the word about signage and work on corridor mapping tool
 - Offer solutions that provide both vehicle and infrastructure
 - Built out alt fuel council, develop guidance documents
 - Think about signage and find synergies among different group efforts
 - Continue to be supportive of state DOT
 - Transition to become part of larger movement to alt fuels out in state in Ohio. Convene contacts from Ohio to get conversations going.

- What are <u>you</u> going to do further movement on alt fuel corridors?
 - Advance corridor program in South Dakota
 - Let market drive direction but can work on signage, keep an open mind, find solutions that work for everybody
 - Work with DOT with any technical assistance
 - Solicit interest in regular meetings for I-80 and I-94 coordination
 - Put corridors on agendas of traffic engineers
 - Remain open minded to expansion opportunities on corridors and influencing beyond the corridors
 - Try to tie initiatives together instead of working in isolation

- What are <u>you</u> going to do further movement on alt fuel corridors?
 - Lead by example with state fleet
 - Take signing issues back to traffic engineers
 - Increase collaboration
 - Serve as a resource to connect with utility contacts
 - Work on updating maps/switch EV pending to EV ready
 - Getting designation finished, initiate collaboration with new contacts
 - Better understand what barriers ODOT is experiencing and how to overcome them
 - Take leadership role with different agencies and get everyone excited about further corridor designations
 - Grant out VW funds for infrastructure
 - Get north Dakota propane ready in the next designation
 - Challenge other midwestern states to have as many designations at IL
 - Make all interstates in IL EV ready
 - Continue educating legislatures so we're informing policy
